

10 YEARS AND COUNTING 2022 RESULTS

Horseshoe crabs become overturned by waves or impinged in rubble or other hazards when they spawn on the beach, putting them at risk to predation and desiccation. Since 2013, hundreds of volunteers have rescued stranded horseshoe crabs in New Jersey, saving the lives of almost one million crabs.

This effort is helping the Delaware Bay horseshoe crab population recover from overharvest in the 1990s. reTURN the Favor volunteers also inspire their friends, family, and communities to help horseshoe crabs and take action to restore the beaches.
