Since 2013, hundreds of volunteers have rescued over a million stranded horseshoe crabs on the Delaware Bay beaches in New Jersey. This effort is helping the Delaware Bay horseshoe crab population recover from overharvest in the 1990s. reTURN the Favor volunteers also inspire their friends, family, and communities to help horseshoe crabs and take action to restore the beaches.






CUMBERLAND AND CAPE MAY DIFFERENT BEACHES DIFFERENT PROBLEMS
